Reveley Colours & Materials

Being a civil engineer and architect, Henry Reveley built many of the first public buildings and most of the private homes in the early days of the Swan River Colony including Government House, the home of Sir James and Lady Ellen Stirling. Many of these homes were simple forms with verandahs, high ceilings and side-gabled or pitched roofs constructed of local materials such as brick sourced from clay in the Swan Valley.

Homes at 'Reveley' should strive to incorporate these elements in a sophisticated and contemporary manner to produce a thoroughly modern urban village. The introduction of a "touch of brick" being either Georgian, painted, glazed or recycled complimented by rendered brickwork and cast metal structures will provide a strong sense of arrival at 'Reveley' as well as producing a cohesive streetscape. Architectural feature elements such as contemporary colonnades and entrance structures along with glazing must be rectangular in form and predominantly vertically

proportioned.





Polished or powdercoated metal is strongly encouraged.

Commercial cladding may be considered for mixed-use buildings.
