

The Drummond Precinct is inspired by James Drummond, horticulturist in charge of Cork Botanical Gardens in Britain before emigrating to the Swan River Colony in 1829 and subsequently being appointed Government Naturalist by Sir James Stirling. This name reflects the strong botanical focus of this precinct that will embrace both European and Western Australian natural cultural heritage.

The built form character will reference the architectural style of the Old Colonial Period. Georgian architecture in particular was the architectural vernacular in Britain at the time of first settlement, of which many of Western Australia's iconic historical buildings made reference to.

A modern interpretation of Georgian architecture in both classic and industrial styles shall be achieved by utilising symmetry and scale as well as feature details such as rendered plinths, sills, piers, arched lintels, high ceilings and gabled roofs. Colours and materials shall be carefully selected in accordance with the examples provided and be inspired by either classic or industrial influences.



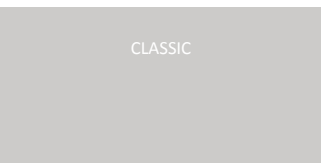
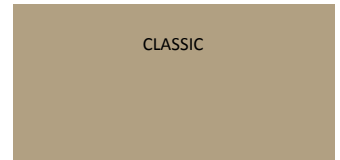
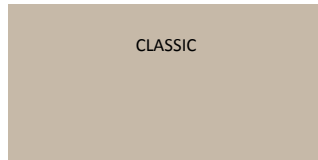
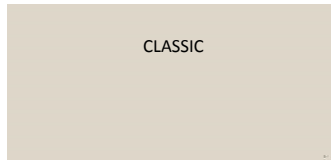
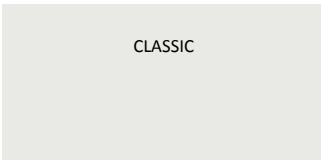

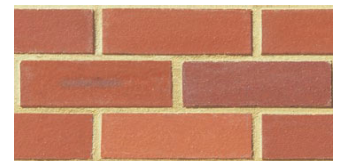

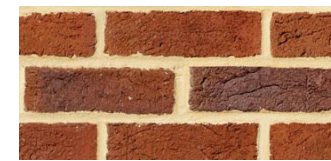
